#### **SPOTLIGHT ON SPRING 2024 COURSES**

#### HS 1025 INTRODUCTION TO HUMAN RIGHTS (ISJ)



This course is a survey of thinking on human rights from antiquity to the present, with special attention to the Universal Declaration Human Rights and other post-1945 developments. Case studies may vary, but will generally include such key human rights concerns as slavery, humanitarian intervention, refugees and displaced persons, postconflict reconstruction, human trafficking, torture, and the death penalty.

#### HS 1131 AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY (ISJ)

This course is an overview of the black experience from its West African roots, through slavery, and finally to freedom in modern America. The focus is on leaders, movements, community, and race relations.
